The Coosa Valley Resource Conservation & Development Council recently awarded a handful of grants to various agencies throughout Coosa County for an assortment of projects.

Representatives with the RC&D Council, along with representatives from each group that was awarded grants, recently visited the elementary school's garden area to thank Rep. Ron Johnson for his assistance in getting the funds to them. They also reviewed what projects have been completed or are in progress thanks to the grant funding.

The approved funding included \$1,000 to the Rockford Public Library; \$4,500 to the Weogufka Center for Arts, Entertainment and Education; \$7,500 for Central High School Coosa County; \$420 to the Coosa County Forestry Planning Committee; and \$1,000 for the Coosa County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Specifically, librarian Glenda Cardwell said the funds were used to purchase 54 non-fiction books and one DVD that related to soil and water conservation and similar topics. She thanked the RC&D Council for the grant and said that she hoped it had been used wisely.

The Weogufka Center received two separate grants, with a \$1,500 grant being used to purchase a quality sound

# SABRA Sanctuary holds annual auction

It was a packed house Thursday night at the George P. Evans Reception Center, as community members and elected officials joined SABRA Sanctuary for its "Boots and Bows" themed silent auction.

The shelter provides services and shelter for those affected by domestic violence.

Renee Callen, SABRA Sanctuary director, encouraged the crowd to dig deep in their pockets and donate to the worthy cause, as they looked at a plethora of items up for grabs.

Callen said she was overwhelmed by the love and support shown from the community.

Sen. Hank Sanders and Rep. Prince Chestnut both spoke on the importance of having an organization like SABRA

Sanctuary in the Selma area.

Chestnut spoke of his personal connection with a former employee of the shelter and how she encouraged him to pursue politics.

"I will definitely support SABRA Sanctuary as long as I'm in the state house," he said.

Callen said it was important to her to

see elected officials at the event because their support "means everything" and they are helping turn SABRA around so that people won't take the center for granted.

The walls of the building were lined with a variety of items, and the crowd got a chance to walk around and place their bids. Cakes, baskets, grouped packaged items and even a furry friend were just some of the items being auctioned off.

Supporter of the shelter and auction attendee Nancy Gantt said the auctions are always fun and they support a good cause. She said he has gotten great items in the past and is a repeat supporter. Gantt, a retired teacher, said she knows how important an organization like SABRA is and how it can help children who come from abusive homes.

"I know of the abuse that goes on in our area," she said.

The auction is just one of the many efforts the organization makes throughout the year to offset the cost of running and supporting the needs of the shelter. Grants play a huge part in their funding as well.

Callen spoke about the importance of

those donors and mentioned Ala-Tom RC&D being a title donor. Ala-Tom RC&D Program Developer Noopie Cosby presented a \$5,000 check to the shelter during the auction.

"This is an organization that meets our mission statement," Cosby said.

He said Ala-Tom is glad to be the shelter's title sponsor and happy to give them a big boost.

"We try to be seed money to help add to their fundraising efforts," Cosby added.

Callen thanked all of the board members and sanctuary employees for doing all they can.

"I was overwhelmed by the dedication and hard work of the board," Callen said.

She said they give so much of their time to maintain the shelter and the shelter would not be there without them.

"People are hurting in our area and it seems like our community is starting to listen," she said.

According to Callen, domestic violence can have lasting effects on more than just the person being abused.

"Domestic violence is not just an individual problem nor even just a family problem, but a community problem," Callen said.

All proceeds raised during the auction will benefit the needs of the shelter.

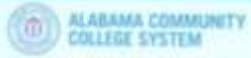
